Villa Decius 11-12 October 2007

Over half a century ago, when Europe was divided by the Iron Curtain, Czesław Miłosz wrote about the phenomenon of the "enslaving of minds" present in the states of the Soviet bloc, and about the "Hegelian bite", responsible for that. Perceiving history as a process controlled by neither a single person nor communities, led Central and Eastern European "captive minds" to affirmation of the status quo and the ascertainment that – since a different world cannot exist – one has to serve the one at hand. Can our minds be enslaved again even now, when the Iron Curtain and the Soviet bloc are nothing more but the past?

The "Captive Mind Revisited" International Conference is an attempt to reflect and discuss these social phenomena which – present in public sphere – should become a subject of deeper interest, not only of academics but also of those individuals and societies who still find the future of the European Union, and its political, economic, social and human dimensions important. The programme of the conference combines intellectual contributions from internationally recognised personalities and European experts with debates and discussion sessions open to representatives of political organisations, academic and cultural milieux, NGOs, public administration, and media from Poland and abroad.

Organised on the 50th anniversary of the Treaty of Rome, the "Captive Mind Revisited" Conference is an attempt at a comprehensive roundup of the 20th-century European chapter and a fresh look into the 21st-century post-utopian Europe. The debates will focus on those "actors" of the public sphere who can influence minds and imagination of societies and who are present on both national and international scene, that is on political ideologies, elites and culture.

With the year 2008 being declared the European Year of Intercultural Dialogue, the Conference will complement the European debate on intercultural issues and challenges and may become a starting point for establishing new quality of political and social dialogue in Europe.

Ceremony of Awarding The Sergio Vieira de Mello Prize

In 2003 the Villa Decius Association initiated establishing the Prize of Sergio Vieira de Mello, the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights. The Prize is awarded to a person and a non-governmental organization for their active involvement in peaceful coexistence and cooperation of communities, religions and denominations, and cultures.

Polish Manor House in Tomaszowice

The Tomaszowice Manor House is a historical, 19th-century manor and park complex situated by the north gateway to Kraków. It is a place saturated with history and the spirit of Old Polish customs where beautiful architecture is harmoniously composed with natural park surroundings. (www.dwor.pl)

The Benedictine Abbey in Tyniec

Tyniec is an 11th-century Gothic fortified abbey standing on a picturesque rocky promontory overlooking the Vistula River and village of Piekary. With its 14th-century St Peter and St Paul's Church, , vicarage, cloisters, treasury, and museum, the Abbey is definitely worth a visit. (www.tyniec.mm.com.pl)

The Wooden Architecture Route

The Wooden Architecture Route in the Region of Małopolska, covers over 1500 km linking 237 architectural sites, ranging from churches, Orthodox churches, chapels and belfries to granaries, rural cottages and manor houses. All the sites on the route are marked and the directions are shown by over 600 signposts. Fortresses, Romanesque and Gothic churches and abbeys, palaces and manors are a living testimony to the history of the Małopolska Region. Preserved here are copious historical remnants of old Polish villages – wooden, and therefore in harmony with the scenery. What is more, the wealth of local culture and art of Małopolska is unmatched throughout Poland. (szlak.wrotamalopolski.pl)
